






Message from the President, by Rene McKinnon

When the war in Europe ended in 1945, many former airmen returning to London wanted to continue their interest in aviation, both as flyers and as friends. This interest led to the creation of the London Air Force Club in early 1947. Other returning airmen had similar plans and a large number of these clubs gradually were established across Canada.

This activity did not go unnoticed by the Minister of National Defence, who in the mid-1940's was concerned with the emergence of new threats, underscored by Churchill's remark that an "iron curtain has descended across the continent." In May 1948, the Cabinet approved the formation of the RCAF Association with an annual grant of \$15,000, no small sum for that time. In September, 1948, a provisional executive was approved and work began. By the end of April 1949, the initial membership drive had converted many of the former Air Force clubs and created 58 Wings with more than five

thousand members and a further thirty-four hundred members-at-large (MAL's.) At the first National Convention, held in Ottawa in May, 1950, the then-provisional President, Air Chief Marshal L.S. Breadner, told the assembly, "We fully appreciate that the strongest link in the organization is the Wing..." and added, "We have found the best advertisement of the Association is our Wings."

Membership growth continued. In 1996, the National Executive began an arrangement that every two years a membership application form would be inserted with the mailing of pension cheques to Canadian Forces personnel. The initial trial gained an increase of some 3000 MAL's over a two-year period and raised the MAL membership to 8366, nearly one thousand more members than those of the Wings. This success triggered speculation that should Wing membership decline, all members of the Association eventually would be MAL's, presumably content to buy regalia and read *Airforce* magazine. However, the surge did not last. This year, the Wings held a total of about 4788 members versus approximately 3619 MAL's. Most importantly, membership numbers for both groups, along with revenues, have been declining for a number of years and for a variety of reasons.

In October, 2011, the National Executive created the position of MAL Director, evidently to bring more MAL involvement and active participation into the activities of the Association. Recruiting greater numbers of MAL's often was accepted as the best way to avoid the fluctuations of membership and with new technology would simplify the administration of the Association, whereas increasing Wing membership was left to be the sole responsibility of individual Wings. One difficulty was that each Wing member was required to pay Association dues plus an add-on charge which was retained by the Wing to meet its own expenditures. As a result, MAL membership dues were much lower than those of the Wings and this encouraged a preference for new members to join as Members-at-Large.

However, no assistance from the NEC can be expected to offset the decline of membership in the Wings. This is remarkable, since a Membership Campaign Plan in 2005 noted that, "The Wing is the principal unit in the Association's organizational structure. Local Wings operate at the grass roots level and have the most direct contact with the Association members as local programs and activities are developed and presented... Wing leaders must identify and target the available audience(s)..."

The most obvious target audience is the MAL. Perhaps the NEC could avert the self-fulfilling prophecy that Wings have no future by initiating a membership drive to encourage MAL's to investigate what their local Wing has to offer, to transfer MAL's on the basis of their postal codes into the Wing closest to their place of residence, to reserve the term "MAL" for those who do not live in Canada and to create an Association that would be one unified, active and productive organization.



If anyone has some RCAF tartan material they are not using, please consider donating it to the Wing. 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

F/Sgt. George Eric Hexter – was a former RCAF Bomb Aimer during WWII. For more than fifty years, he has been a member of 427 (London) Wing, AFAC. He has been awarded the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal; it was presented to him on Friday, the 30th of November, 2012 by the Right Honourable Irene Mathyssen, (NDP) MP for London Fanshawe. F/Sgt. Hexter had previously received the D.F.M. for his actions.





F/Sgt. Hexter and F/Sgt. Schofield were bomb aimer and pilot respectively on an aircraft detailed to attack Stuttgart one night in March, 1944. When they were about 150 miles from the target, the aircraft was attacked by a fighter. Before the enemy aircraft could be evaded, the bomber had sustained much damage and F/Sgt. Hexter had been wounded in the hand and foot. Undeterred, the pilot continued his mission and eventually reached the target over which he was ably guided by F/Sgt. Hexter who, although in constant pain, had insisted on remaining at his post.

Shortly afterwards, the oxygen supply failed, but the pilot came down to a lower altitude and flew the damaged aircraft to his country where he affected a safe landing at an airfield near the coast. These airmen displayed skill, courage and determination of the highest order. F/Sgt. Hexter also set a fine example of courage and fortitude; his conduct in trying circumstances is worthy of great praise. Congratulations on your medal from all the London (427) Wing members.

A Synopsis of the Business Review and Analysis Project, by President Rene McKinnon As you know, Randy Warden was contracted to conduct a Business Review & Analysis of 427 (London) Wing. The following is a synopsis of the presentation that was made to the Wing members by Mr Warden. The Scope of Work focused on two areas: the Analysis Phase (abbreviated as SWOT) and the Implementation phase (the next steps after the analysis has been studied.) The Analysis Phase was broken down into four sections – Financial & Documentation Review – SWOT Analysis, (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats) – Member Survey. Meetings with some of the Wing members were conducted – Analysis and Recommendations

When this was completed Randy held a meeting at the Wing on November 8th to report his findings and offer his recommendations. From your surveys, Randy found out the following information.

- Main Strengths common interest and background; welcoming environment; sound leadership; good community partnerships.
- Main Weaknesses aging and declining membership; complacency; low turnout for important events and meetings; declining revenue; facility is old and in remote location; volunteer fatigue; no public transportation; low public awareness; non-effective use of technology such as social media.
- Main Opportunities Wing is the predominant Air Force presence in the region; new Chief of the Defence Staff is Air Force; London region has a strong military equipment manufacturing presence

for possible recruiting from the community; Air Cadet Programs.

 Main Threats – competition from other service organizations; membership complacency, if not checked, could intensify declining membership problems; aging membership results in less revenue; weakened economic impact; short term lease on land.

Recommendations for the Implementation Phase:

- Convene an executive strategic planning session. Determine if Wing should dissolve or plan for the future. Decide which issues are of the greatest importance to the survivability of the Wing.
- Implement a Business Plan.
- Assign Ownership and Implement Action Plan.

There was much more involved at Randy's key reporting meeting held Nov 8, 2012 with only seven members of the Wing Executive in attendance. This meeting was open to all Wing members who wished to attend. The above represents only the highlights to inform members of the options available. Unofficial minutes were recorded and can be circulated to you. They do, however, stress the urgency to move forward and the need for membership assistance.


Jobs I've Tried
