What is a Sweetheart Brooch? Contributed by Linda Brimson

During WWI and WWII, servicemen leaving home for the front line had to say goodbye to those they loved, and often left gifts and keepsakes for those they'd be missing. One popular gift was a small brooch depicting the service crest or regimental badge of the soldier. This gift was intended for soldiers to show that their home and families would be in their hearts during their absence. The name "sweetheart" can be misleading here, as it suggests that the item was only given to those in intimate relationships, but this isn't the case. The sweetheart brooch was given to anyone the soldier would be leaving behind; this could be their wife, parents, siblings and even children. If it was given to a wife or a girlfriend, it was worn by that woman as a symbol of their pride and regard for their soldier.

The brooches were small and fitted with pins so they could be worn on a blouse or a lapel. Some were handmade and "homemade" by enterprising servicemen for others. As the brooches became popular, jewellers saw the opportunity for profit and started commercial production. These brooches were usually smaller and made of gold or silver rather than coloured base metals; some jewellers used precious stones.

A Royal Air Force Love Story

RAF member Bill Webster and his wife Helen shared a wartime love story. Bill was an active Royal Canadian Legion member and 427 Wing member. Bill and his family, Helen, son John and daughter Anne, made the wooden poppy crosses that travelled to war graves all over the world.

The romance started in Goderich when Bill was posted to Port Albert Air Navigation School in 1940, as an RAF LAC1 (electrician and gunner). His RAF base in UK had moved three times due to bombing. Even in Wales, the base did not escape Luftwaffe air raids.

As part of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan, Bill's entire base of training Anson aircraft and other equipment was dismantled and loaded on a fast ship to secretly sail unescorted across the Atlantic. Passengers on board did not know their destination. Bill thought they might be going to Africa. Arriving at the port of Montreal Canada was a big surprise and a well-kept secret! Further train travel allowed personnel and equipment to disembark at Goderich Ontario and travel by truck a few miles north to the new Port Albert training base. Bill and his service group were among the first arrivals.

Bill had many entertaining stories as a Brit getting used to Canadian winters and Canadian customs. Camp personnel would travel to Goderich from Port Albert base in an old bus heated with a wood stove! In better weather, the locals were always obliging to offer any serviceman a ride to town. The town bakery (now Culbert's) was a popular spot, as were diners and coffee shops. The late D. J. Curry and his son Arthur took over the bakery in 1906 and named it Curry's West Street Bakery. Mel Culbert took over the bakery in 1942 and for most years since, a Culbert family member has owned it. The delectable location is going strong today, as visitors can attest.

Bill was from Brighton, Sussex on the coast, just 50 miles southwest of London England. He met Helen in a Goderich coffee shop. Helen's mother was raised just one street from Bill's family home on Lynton Street, off Elm Grove in Brighton, England. That coincidence led to Bill receiving an invitation to come for an "English dinner" and he and Helen hit it off.

Unusually, Bill's posting at Port Albert lasted three years. As an electrician he was a "permanent" post as opposed to a trainee in the many air navigation courses. He maintained aircraft, helped repair damage from any "prangs" (crashes or bad landings); and took turns on the harbour boat. The boat was always on standby in case any aircraft ditched in Lake Huron.

Bill was young and had to ask permission of his parents to be married. Their wedding was June 1941. In late 1943, Bill was recalled to England and Helen as his wife, went by separate ship and lived with Bills' parents and sister Jean, in Brighton for the duration of the war. Helen had lots to learn and joke about, despite rationing, air raids, bomb scares, and the threats civilians and service men and women faced. There existed a wonderful camaraderie and the young people wanted to live in the moment. They enjoyed good music, great dances and everyone worked together. Bill's older brother Bert had survived being pinned down at Dunkirk and suffered hearing loss and emotional damage from that har-

rowing experience. The Webster boys and Jean's husband Ernie (posted in Europe and Africa) all survived the war.


Bill's experience in Ontario Canada convinced him of opportunities available there after the war. In England, housing was scarce and rationing continued. Bill and Helen came to Canada in January 1948 and raised a family: son John, and daughter Anne. Bill enjoyed a long career as electrical supervisor at Victoria Hospital, London Ontario. Bill lost his dear Helen in November 2000 and himself lived to be 99, passing in November 2020.

History of Port Albert No. 31 Air Navigation School, Port Albert, Ontario

No. 31 Air Navigation School (ANS) was originally located in various locations in England, and lastly, at St. Athens, Wales. During the Battle of Britain, frequent aerial bombings from the German Luftwaffe made training in the United Kingdom dangerous. As a result, No. 31 ANS was relocated to Port Albert, Ontario, opening October 1940.

Training

Port Albert, located on the shores of Lake Huron, was an ideal location for navigational training as it gave students experience navigating over land and water. Typically, students at No. 31 Air Navigation School would first learn in a classroom how to read and use the astral compass and how to plot a course using landmarks. Next, they would train with the Ground Simulation Trainer. Finally, they would complete daytime and nighttime navigational flights, using the Link Trainer and Astral Link trainer. Most graduates were stationed in the United Kingdom and became members of Bomber Command. No. 31 Air Navigation School produced 1,964 student navigators and observers. The base closed on February 17, 1945.


